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PREFACE

I am pleased to present the Pennsylvania Bureau of Correction's 1981 Annual Statistical Report. This report provides pertinent information concerning the size and characteristics of the inmate population.

During 1981, the Bureau of Correction has experienced its largest annual increase of inmate population. This rapid influx of inmates has made it necessary for us to double cell inmates for the very first time in every correctional facility.

The Bureau has recently acquired modern data processing equipment through a grant from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency. This report reflects some of our new data processing capabilities which will be fully incorporated into next year's annual statistical report.

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INTRODUCTION

This report presents a descriptive, statistical summary of the inmates admitted to, released from and confined in the Pennsylvania Bureau of Correction for the calendar year 1981.

The data provided in the Pennsylvania Bureau of Correction's 1981 Annual Statistical Report are for the most part self-explanatory and hence does not merit narrative elaboration. However, a summary narrative has been provided to quickly identify major points of interest.

Legislative Mandate

The Pennsylvania Bureau of Correction was established by Sections 911, 912, 913, 914, 914.1, 915 and 916 of the Act of April 9, 1929 (P.L. 177, No. 175). The Bureau of Correction is currently an administrative agency of the Office of the General Counsel (Act of October 15, 1980; P.L. 950, No. 164).

Administrative Responsibility

Under the direction of Commissioner of Correction Ronald J. Marks the Bureau of Correction is responsible for seven state correctional institutions, two state regional correctional facilities, fifteen community service centers, an inmate population in excess of 10,000 and a staff complement in excess of 3,000.

Purpose of the Report

The report has the following three purposes

- 1. It gives correctional administrators and planners within the Commonwealth summary data involving inmate population movements and counts of inmates committed to and confined in the Bureau of Correction;
- 2. It provides concerned legislators and judicial personnel with a yearly record of inmates confined in the Bureau of Correction; and
- 3. It serves as the Bureau's official document for statistical correctional information, and subsequently is distributed to state criminal justice agencies. Commonwealth officials, the State library systems, etc.

Definitions

- 1. State correctional institution These institutions represent the Bureau's major correctional facilities, located at Camp Hill, Dallas, Graterford, Huntingdon, Muncy, Pittsburgh and Rockview. The State Correctional Institution at Muncy receives all female commitments to the Bureau of Correction.
- 2. State regional correctional facility These are specialized facilities in two of the Commonwealth's six "Common Human Service Regions" which usually receive inmates sentenced from six months to two years. The two regional correctional facilities are located at Greensburg and Mercer.
- 3. Community service centers These centers provide community based programs for offenders that operate as a continum to the rehabilitative services provided in state correctional institutions or regional correctional facilities and provide a transitional period between incarceration and release. Community service centers are residences in the community with custodial structure and a strong emphasis on guidance and counseling, with the hope of preparing the inmate for parole. The Bureau operates fifteen community service centers, three of which are exclusively for women.
- 4. Group homes These homes provide another phase of transition from prison to community living. For those inmates who do not need the structured setting provided by the residential community service center, a group or individual home is an appropriate setting. This type of placement provides the former institutionalized inmate with a considerable amount of responsibility and freedom while they receive both supervision and an increased opportunity for rehabilitative treatment.
- 5. Specified population movements Generally, most admission and release movements used in this report are self-explanatory. Population movements will include administrative turnovers (inmates paroled or released to begin a new sentence) and routine status changes. To aid the reader of this report, certain movements are further defined as follows:
 - a. Authorized temporary absences Court authorized appearances for inmate writs, hearings, funerals, etc. Always under jurisdiction of the local court.
 - b. Bureau transfers generally referred to as 'intrasystem' transfers between state correctional institutions, state regional correctional facilities, community service centers, and group homes under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Correction. Includes all permanent and temporary transfers within the Bureau of Correction.
 - c. Detained by other authorities Generally represents Bureau of Correction inmates who were arrested while on furlough or captured while on escape status and are facing new charges, or serving another sentence in another jurisdiction, or are suspects in a crime and are being elsewhere pending transfer back to the Bureau of Correction.

- d. Detentioners Inmates awaiting trial or sentencing after a trial, but in all cases without a sentence transferred from a county prison and detained in the Bureau of Correction for medical or security reasons.
- e. Furlough Inmates are released on furlough for purpose of family visits, job applications, and pre-release planning. Inmates on furlough are not supervised but are still under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Correction.
- f. Interstate compact Inmates transferred to the Bureau of Correction to serve time due another state under the Interstate Compact for Corrections (ICC) or an inmate under the ICC returning to the state which the time is being served.
- g. Intersystem transfers Includes transfers between state correctional facilities (regionals included) and county prisons, state and local mental hospitals, and other state and jurisdictions.
- h. Miscellaneous Generally includes inmates released to and received from authorities for various reasons, and administrative releases to adjust and or correct inmate population counts.
- i. Special escorted leave Inmates released for a short period of time for various reasons but always under the escort of institution or regional staff. Most of these are returned the same day.

Weekenders - Inmates committed to service time only on weekends or when not working. At the present time, weekend sentences are only served at the Greensburg State Regional Correctional Facility.

CRIMES AND OFFENSE CATEGORIES

Source

In order to enable the reader to better comprehend the definition of crimes and offenses referred to in this report, all offense classifications found under the "Crime Index Offenses" (formerly Part I crimes) have been defined. The majority of definitions are taken from the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, Title 18, "Crimes and Offenses," 1980 Edition, though some definitions have been obtained from the Uniform Crime Report: Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 1980 Annual Report, for purpose of clarity and offense specificity.

Differentiation of Crimes

For reporting purposes, crimes are broken down into two major categories: (1) Crime Index Offenses (formerly Part I Offenses) and (2) Part II Offenses. According to the Pennsylvania State Police, Crime Index Offenses are...

...crimes that are considered by law enforcement to be the most serious crimes that readily come to the attention of police and occur with a frequency great enough to be reported as a separate category. Crime Index Offenses are used nationally as a basis for comparison of criminal activity.

Crime Index Offenses are further differentiated into major categories. The Crime Index categories of murder, nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault comprise the general category of "Violent Crime," while the categories of burglary, larceny-theft, and moter vehicle theft comprise the general category of "Property Crime."

Those offenses which are not classified as Index Crime Offenses are simply classified as Part II offenses. There are 19 distinct Part II Offense categories; however, for purposes of brevity, all categories are not included in the commitment table, nor are they defined.

Definitions of Crime Index Offenses

Criminal homicide

- (a) Offense defined a person is guilty of criminal homicide if he intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or negligently causes the death of another human being.
- (b) Classification Criminal homicide shall be classified as murder, voluntary manslaughter, or involuntary manslaughter.

Murder

(a) Murder of the first degree - A criminal homicide constitutes murder of the first degree when it is committed by an intentional killing.

- (b) Murder of the second degree A criminal homicide constitutes murder of the second degree when it is committed while defendant was engaged as a principal or an accomplice in the perpetration of a felony.
- (c) Murder of the third degree All other kinds of murder shall be murder of the third degree. Murder of the third degree is a felony of the first degree.

Voluntary manslaughter

- (a) General rule a person who kills an individual without lawful justification commits voluntary manslaughter if at the time of the killing he is acting under a sudden and intense passion resulting from serious provocation by:
 - (1) the individual killed; or
 - (2) another whom the actor endeavors to kill, but he negligently or accidentally causes the death of the individual killed.

Involuntary manslaughter

(a) General rule - A person is guilty or involuntary manslaughter when as a direct result of the doing of an unlawful act in a reckless or grossly negligent manner, or the doing of a lawful act in a reckless or grossly negligent manner, he causes the death of another person.

Rape

A person commits a felony of the first degree when he engages in sexual intercourse with another person not his spouse:

- (1) by forcible compulsion;
- (2) by threat of forcible compulsion that would prevent resistance by a person of reasonable resolution;
- (3) who is unconscious: or
- (4) who is so mentally deranged or deficient that such person is incapable of consent.

Robbery

(a) Offense defined

- (1) A person is guilty of robbery if, in the course of committing a theft, he:
 - (I) Inflicts serious bodily injury upon another;
 - (II) Threatens another with or intentionally puts him in fear of immediate serious bodily injury:
 - (III) Commits or threatens immediately to commit any felony of the first or second degree;
 - (IV) Inflicts bodily injury upon another or threatens another with or intentionally puts him in fear of immediate bodily injury; or
 - (V) Physically takes or removes property from the person of another by force however slight.

(2) An act shall be deemed "in the course of committing a theft" if it occurs in an attempt to commit theft or in flight after the attempt or commission.

Aggravated assault

(a) Offense defined - A person is guilty of aggravated assault if he:

attempts to cause serious bodily injury to another, or causes such injury intentionally, knowingly or recklessly under circumstances manifesting extreme indifference to the value of human life;

- (2) attempts to cause or intentionally, knowingly or recklessly causes serious bodily injury to a police officer making or attempting to make a lawful arrest;
- (3) attempts to cause or intentionally or knowingly causes bodily injury to a police officer making or attempting to make a lawful arrest; or attempts to cause or intentionally or knowingly causes bodily injury to another with a deadly weapon.
- (b) Grading Aggravated assault under paragraph (a) (1) and (a) (2) of this section is a felony of the second degree. Aggravated assault under paragraphs (a) (3) and (a) (4) of this section is a misdemeanor of the first degree.

Burglary

(a) Offense defined - a person is guilty of burglary if he enters a building or occupied structure, or separately secured or occupied portion thereof, with intent to commit a crime therein, unless the premises are at the time open to the public or the actor is licensed or privileged to enter.

Larceny-theft

(a) Definition - Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles of value without the use of force, violence, or fraud. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, bicycle theft, etc. For the purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, this offense category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery or worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is a separate Index Crime and, therefore, is also excluded.

Motor vehicle theft

(a) Definition - Motor vehicle theft is the illegal taking of a motor vehicle, or driving the vehicle without the owner's consent. Attempted motor vehicle thefts are included. This category includes theft of motor-driven vehicles, such as automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters, and snowmobiles. Specifically excluded is the temporary use when the vehicle is actually returned by the user, and lawful access to the vehicle has been granted or can be assumed.

Arson

- (a) Endangering persons A person commits a felony of the first degree if he intentionally starts a fire or causes an explosion, whether on his own property or on that of another, and thereby recklessly places another person in danger of death or bodily injury.
- (b) Endangering property A person commits a felony of the second degree if he:
 - (1) Starts a fire or causes an explosion with intent of destroying or occupied structure of another;
 - (2) Intentionally starts a fire or causes an explosion, whether on his own property or on that of another and thereby recklessly places a building or occupied structure of another in danger of damage or destruction; or
 - (3) Starts a fire or causes an explosion with intent of destroying or damaging any property, whether his own or of another, to collect insurance for such loss.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Inmate Populations

Like the rest of the Nation, Pennsylvania is experiencing significant growth in inmate population and for the first time is double-celling inmates.

During 1981, population in the Bureau of Correction increased by 1,177 inmates or 14.3% from 8,243 to 9,420. This represents an average increase of 98 inmates per month.

Some major characteristics of the Bureau's inmate population are described below.

- 1. 45.3% are white.
- 2. 96.7% are males.
- 3. 34.6% are twenty-five years of age and under.
- 4. 24.5% are serving time for robbery, 20.4% for murder (all types), and 17.4% for burglary.
- 5. Excluding regional correctional facilities, 34.3% and 10.8% are from Philadelphia and Allegheny counties respectively.
- 6. 10.6% are serving life sentences.

Receptions

During 1981, receptions to the nine state and regional correctional facilities increased by 14.7% from 4,475 in 1980 to 5,135 in 1981. Of all receptions, 79.4% were court commitments and 19.7% were recommitted by state and county paroling authorities to serve back-time.

Nearly one-half of all court commitments represented three offenses: burglary (22.6%) robbery (21.4%), and theft (7.7%). 72.1% of all court commitments were for Crime Index Offenses.

Excluding state regional correctional facilities, 49.6% of all court commitments were white and 92.9% were males. Nearly one-half of these court commitments were from three counties: Philadelphia (30.2%), Allegheny (10.9%), and Montgomery (7.5%).

Releases

During 1981, 3,451 inmates were paroled or reparoled by state (2,693) and local (958) paroling authorities. Another 473 inmates were released unconditionally by expiration of maximum sentence (311) or by court order (162).

Inmates released from state correctional institutions served an average of two years, seven months, two days while inmates released from regional correctional facilities served an average of eleven months, twelve days.





The above chart shows a dramatic increase in violent incidents during a six month period in 1981 after double celling had begun in comparison with the same six month period in 1981 when no inmates were being double celled.
