We are pleased to present the 1997 Annual Statistical Report on Pennsylvania's state prison system. This report provides a statistical overview of inmates admitted to, incarcerated in, and released from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections in Calendar Year 1997. The report also offers a limited historical perspective on inmate profile changes for calendar years 1987 through 1997.

Recognizing the importance of reliable data for effective planning and evaluation efforts, the Department is committed to the ongoing development and refinement of our information systems and the corresponding published data reports. These efforts are being continuously undertaken in order to provide policy makers and correctional administrators with the timely and accurate data necessary to effectively manage the Department's nearly 12,000 employees, 23 prisons, 15 community corrections centers, one motivational boot camp, and more than 34,000 inmates.

We trust that this annual statistical report will serve to increase your understanding of the state prison system, its inmate population, and the significant challenges which the Department as well as Pennsylvania's entire criminal justice system are addressing

MIS Bureau Functional Statement

The mission of the MIS Bureau is to provide useful information, services, and support to the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. The Bureau is responsible for the overall information management needs of the Department of Corrections and is comprised of three divisions, Automated Technology Support, Applications, and Planning, Research, and Statistics. Division responsibilities include; managing, operating, and providing technical services for the Department's mainframe computer, LAN, and microcomputer systems; development and maintenance of the Department's software applications; and developing and managing the Department's planning, research, and statistics activities; respectively.

PRS Division Functional Statement

The Division is responsible for directing the ongoing planning, research, and statistics activities of the Department. This includes coordinating departmental research initiatives; preparing various planning and research reports based on correctional databases; implementing standards, guidelines, and procedures for state research and data analysis activities; identifying and defining correctional planning and research problems, preparing research models appropriate to the problem, developing instrumentation and procedures for data measurement, collecting and analyzing data, and submitting recommendations for departmental research and evaluation priorities.

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
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
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Department History

Pennsylvania's Correctional Institutions





Academic & Vocational Education. Education programs, which are primarily provided by the Department of Education, are provided in order to give the inmates proper tools to compete for jobs and to function in a literate society. Academic education focuses upon assisting inmates to reach the 5th grade progressing to the 8th grade level of education and ultimately their GED. Vocational education teaches inmates viable work skills in various trades. Post secondary classes are available for inmates who maintain a stable adjustment and are expected to gain release; these classes focus on business and vocational skills. English as a second language is provided for non-English speaking inmates. Approximately 9,000 inmates are currently involved in academic or vocational training. **Religion and Family**

Services. Religious services are offered to inmates. Family services encourage other agencies and volunteers to provide supportive services to inmates and their families.

Release Planning. All Department facilities offer various programs geared towards assisting the inmate to re-enter the community. These programs generally include job seeking skills, accessing community resources, parole requirements, etc.

Parenting Classes. Parenting classes are offered in many of the institutions to both female and male inmates. The groups focus upon teaching healthy parenting skills which will increase their and their children's chances of remaining in the community as viable citizens.

Older Offenders. The Department contracts with community organizations to provide services specifically geared to inmates over 55 years of age. Many of these inmates have lost their community support systems and benefit from assistance in helping them to eventually assimilate back into their communities.


Miscellaneous Treatment Programs. Various individual and group counseling programs are offered which deal with areas such as: stress reduction, anger management, assertiveness training, medication compliance, adjusting to incarceration, etc.

Case Management Services. Each inmate is assigned to a counselor and a unit management team. The team provides casework and counseling services in Individual and group settings. Each inmate is constantly involved in a prescriptive program plan which identifies problem areas and suggests programs to deal with those problems.

Psychological Services. Psychological services are provided upon initial intake and as needed throughout the period of incarceration. For those inmates who require more in depth treatment, the Department has on-site, licensed mental health units and special needs units which offer more intense treatment.

Sex Offender Treatment. Sex offender treatment is provided at the majority of the Department's facilities. The programs are conducted by departmental employees as well as by outside providers. The treatment ranges from groups for "non-admitters" to a therapeutic community approach. Topics include sex education. identifying "triggers" and relapse prevention. Approximately 1,500 inmates are currently involved in some form of sex offender treatment. Activities & Recreation.



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The total number of receptions to the Department of Corrections (DOC) remained relatively constant, decreasing by only 1.3% from 9,517 in 1996 to 9,390 in 1997.

Court commitments comprised 64.6%, an increase of 5.7% from 5,736 in 1996 to 6,064 in 1997

Parole violators constituted 34.2%, a decrease of 12.7% from 3,673 in 1996 to 3,207 in 1997

County transfers comprised for 1.3%, an increase of 10.2% from 108 in 1996 to 119 in 1997.

The Department experienced changes in the type of commitments received from 1996 to 1997 including the following:

Philadelphia County, ranked first among counties in highest total number of state prison court commitments in 1997, had a 7.9% increase in the number of court commitments from 1,831 in 1996 to 1,975 in 1997.

Allegheny County, ranked second among counties in the total number of state prison court commitments in 1997, experienced a 3.1% decrease in the number of court commitments from 547 in 1996 to 530 in 1997.

Male court commitments increased by 4.9% from 5,375 in 1996 to 5,636 in 1997.

Female court commitments increased by 18.6% from 361 in 1996 to 428 in 1997

Offenses

Overview

Receptions

The types of primary offenses for which offenders were committed to the Department also changed during the 1996 to 1997 period:

Court commitments for Part One Offenses increased by 5.9% from 2,718 in 1996 to 2,878 in 1997, while commitments for Part Two Offenses increased by 5.7% from 2,991 in 1996 to 3,160 in 1997.

Kidnapping commitments increased over the period by 50.0%, while statutory rape commitments decreased by 51.9%.

Narcotic drug commitments remained relatively constant, increasing by less than one percent (0.8%) from 1,770 in 1996 to 1,784 in 1997.

Lifers

The profile of new receptions serving a life sentence increased by 7.0% from 143 in 1996 to 153 in 1997.

The number of lifers received as a percentage of the total number of DOC receptions remained steady, 1.5% in 1996 and 1.6% in 1997.


Males accounted for 97% of the total lifer receptions in both 1996 and 1997







Population

The state prison incarceration rate in Pennsylvania remained relatively constant increasing by 1.4% from 286.5 per 100,000 state residents in 1996 to 290.6 per 100,000 in 1997. Incarceration rates for selected counties in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania changed at varying rates from 1996 to 1997:

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Philadelphia County increased 2.3% from 946.6 per 100,000 in 1996 to 968.8 per 100,000 in 1997.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Dauphin County increased 7% from 489.9 per 100,000 in 1996 to 517.9 per 100,000 in 1997.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Erie County decreased 2 from 438.4 per 100,000 in 1996 to 427.7 per 100,000 in 1997.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Lycoming County decreased 8% from 351.0 per 100,000 in 1996 to 344.6 per 100,000 in 1997.

The Department's offender population remained relatively constant, increasing by only 1.2% from 34,537 on December 31, 1996 to 34,964 on December 31, 1997. The population was comprised of 83.1% sentenced offenders and 16.9% parole violators.

The total number of sentenced offenders increased by 2.9% from 28,219 in 1996 to 29,038 in 1997. Sentenced offenders serving time for Part One and Part Two Offenses represent 57.9% and 25.2%, respectively, of the total Department of Corrections population.

Parole violator returns decreased by 6.2% from 6,316 in 1996 to 5,925 in 1997

The Department's capacity increased by 2.8% from 22,244 in 1996 to 22,875 in 1997. In relationship to the offender population in 1997, the Department operated at 152.4% of institutional capacity, a 2.4% decrease from 1996.

A demographic breakdown of the Department's inmates indicates that offender age, race, and gender have remained relatively constant over the 1996 to 1997 period:

The average age of a DOC offender in 1997 was 35.0 and the majority of offenders (54.8%) were within the ages of 25-39 years.

The number of inmates under age 18 increased by 58.7%, from 75 in 1996 to 119 in 1997.

In 1997, the majority of DOC offenders were African Americans (56.5%), followed by Caucasians (33.4%), Hispanics (9.5%), and other races (0.6%).

Of the 34,964 offenders in the DOC population as of calendar year-end 1997, 33,553 (96.0%) were males and 1,411 (4.0%) were females.

The number of inmates serving a minimum sentence over 10 and up to 20 years increased by 14.5% from 2,121 in 1996 to 2,428 in 1997.

The characteristics of offenders serving life sentences in the Department changed during the 996 to 1997 period:

The number of offenders serving a life sentence increased by 5.0% from 3,128 in 996 to 3,283 in 1997.

The average age of lifers in 1997 was 39.2 years, up from 37.8 years in 1996. The average age for the lifer population remains higher than the average for the total population (39.2 years versus 35.0 years respectively).



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Releases

The total number of inmates released from the Department of Corrections increased by 21.0% from 8,043 in 1996 to 9,729 in 1997. Of the 1997 total, 23.8% were Part One Offenders, 33.8% were Part Two Offenders, and 41.2% were parole violators.

The type of releases from the Department varied for the period 1996 to 1997

The number of unconditional releases (i.e., max outs, executions, and court orders) increased 31.6% from 1,920 in 1996 to 2,526 in 1997 representing 5.6% of the total population in 1996 and 7.2% in 1997.

The number of conditional releases (i.e., state paroles, county paroles, and reparoles) increased 19.4% from 5,611 in 1996 to 6,702 in 1997 representing 16.2% of the total population in 1996 and 19.2% in 1997.

The number of deaths decreased by 14.2% from 127 in 1996 to 109 in 1997. However, as a percentage of the total population, the percentage of deaths has remained constant, 0.4% in 1996 and 0.3% in 1997.

During 1997, the number of paroles granted by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP), as a percentage of the total number of parole actions, increased for the first time since 1991. The percentage of paroles granted increased 3.0% points from 38.8% in 1996 to 41.8% in 1997.

Since December 31, 1994, no inmates serving life sentences were commuted from the Department of Corrections. However, 58 inmates serving life sentences died over this same period.

The average time served for all sentenced offenders increased by 10.8% from 44.4 months in 1996 to 49.2 months in 1997. Since 1992, the average time served by DOC sentenced offenders increased 42.6% from 34.5 months in 1992 to 49.2 in 1997.

The average time served for Part One offenders released increased by 4.5% from 59.8 months in 1996 to 62.5 months in 1997.

The average time served for aggravated assault increased by 18.4% from 51.2 months in 1996 to 60.6 months in 1997.


The average time served for arson increased by 23.6% from 47.4 months in 1996 to 58.6 months in 1997.

The average time served for Part Two offenders released increased by 5% from 35.7 months in 1996 and 39.8 months in 1997.

The average time served for kidnapping decreased by 19.4% from 94.7 months in 1996 to 76.3 months in 1997.





Miscellaneous

The total number of breach escapes and walk aways from the Department of Corrections decreased from 1996 to 1997.

The total number of breach escapes from institutions increased over the 1996 to 1997 period from 4 to 6, respectively. All six of the 1997 institutional breach escapes were apprehended within approximately 10 days of their escape.

The total number of walk aways from institutions increased from 2 in 1996 to 6 in 1997

The total number of walk aways from community corrections centers decreased from 97 in 1996 to 77 in 1997.

The total number of victim registrations decreased from 1996 to 1997, while the total number of victim notifications and comments increased during the period.

The total number of victims who registered with the Department of Corrections during 1997 decreased 49.8% from 5,757 in 1996 to 2,888 in 1997.

The total number of victims notified increased 35.8% from ,473 in 1996 to 2,000 in 1997.

The total number of victims who provided comments to the Department increased 3.8% from 290 in 1996 to 301 in 1997.

The Department of Corrections overall personnel complement remained relatively constant, increasing by only 1.6% from 11,768 filled positions in 1996 to 11,960 filled positions in 1997



G ossary

Capacity: The maximum number of single cell beds a facility was originally designed for, plus beds added or eliminated due to renovations and/or additions.

Capital cases: Inmates found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced by a judge to death by execution.

Commutations: A change of a legal penalty or punishment to a lesser one. A commutation for an inmate serving a life sentence is the establishment of a parole date.

Conditional release: The release of an inmate from the Department of Corrections to another supervising authority. This method of release includes the following types:

<u>State Parole:</u> When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

<u>County Parole:</u> When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by a county probation/parole department.

<u>Reparoled (State)</u>: When an inmate is paroled from a state correctional facility, returned to the Department of Corrections for a parole violation, serves time in the institution, and is again released to the community under supervision of the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

County transfers: When an inmate serving a county sentence is transferred to the Department of Corrections. The reason for the transfer could be for security, medical, or mental health reasons.

Court commitments: A commitment imposed by a court sentencing an individual to confinement in a state correctional facility.

Detentioners: An inmate who has not been sentenced to a Pennsylvania state correctional facility, but who is being housed in a Pennsylvania state correctional facility at the request of another jurisdiction such as a county, another state, or the federal government.

Escape: The intentional act of an inmate to leave the custody of the Department of Corrections. The act of escape includes the following types:

<u>Breach escape:</u> When an inmate, in the process of intentionally leaving the custody of the Department of Corrections, compromises the security perimeter of the facility.

<u>Walk away escape:</u> When an inmate intentionally leaves the custody of the DOC while on an authorized release or furlough (i.e., work detail, medical treatment, educational release, etc.). A walk away, as opposed to a breach escape, does not compromise the security perimeter of the facility as it occurs outside the security perimeter (i.e., wall, fence, etc.).

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Glossary

Incarceration rate: The number of state sentenced inmates incarcerated per 100,000 Pennsylvania residents.

Lifer: An individual with a maximum sentence of life.

Minimum sentence: The minimum amount of time imposed by the court that an inmate must serve before being eligible for release from prison. This sentence cannot exceed one-half of the maximum sentence under Pennsylvania statute.

Maximum sentence: The maximum amount of time imposed by the court that an inmate can be required to serve before being released from prison.

Offender: Generally refers to an individual who is convicted of an offense but who has not been received by the state prison system. This term is used in the Receptions Section of this report to denote newly admitted individuals.

Parole violators: Persons paroled from prison who violated the terms and/or conditions of their parole. Parole violators are generally classified as technical or convicted violators. Technical violators are recommitted for failure to adhere to the requirements of their parole plan (i.e., non-reporting to agent or program, non-criminal drug violations, etc.), while convicted violators are found guilty of new criminal offenses. A technical/convicted violator is committed for violating conditions of parole in addition to being charged with commission of a new criminal offense.

Part I Offenses: Offenses identified by the Uniform Crime Report which are of a serious nature and are usually reported to law enforcement agencies. Crimes identified as Part I offenses include: criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Part II Offenses: Offenses not classified as Part I Offenses as defined above because they are less serious crimes. Crimes identified as Part II offenses include: fraud, stolen property, forgery, narcotic drugs, and drunken driving.

Sentenced: Inmates who are serving time on court-imposed sentences. (Does not include inmates who are serving time because of parole violations.)

Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Offense Groupings: Offense classifications employed by Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. In order to remain compatible with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the categories of offense classification utilized are the same as those employed at the national level. The crimes defined in this classification system are grouped as Part I or Part II offenses.

Unconditional release: The means of release for inmates who have either served their maximum sentence or have had their sentences reduced or vacated by the court (e.g., max out, executed, court order, etc.).

Victim comments: Oral and written statements describing the impact of crime on the victim and/or the victim's feelings regarding pre-release of a particular offender.

Victim registration: When crime victims request to be informed as to the status of offenders who perpetrated criminal acts against them or a family member. The registration occurs in the victim input and notification program as administered by the Office of the Victim Advocate.
