

PRISON RAPE ELIMINATION ACT ANNUAL REPORT

Introduction

The Pennsylvania Department of Corrections (PA DOC) is committed to meeting the goals of the U.S. Department of Justice Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) of 2003 (C.F.R. Part 115) by making every effort to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. In 2015, 14 of the Department's State Correctional Institutions (SCIs) and six Community Correction Centers (CCCs) were certified compliant. By the conclusion of the first audit cycle on August 19, 2016, all SCIs and CCCs will have been audited with the expectation of full compliance.

The statistical data referenced in this report for Commonwealth operated facilities was drawn from the records of the PA DOC's Office of Special Investigations and Intelligence (OSII). The OSII tracks reported investigations conducted within the Department's 25 SCIs, Quehanna Boot Camp, and 13 CCCs¹. The PREA incident-based data is recorded in accordance with the federal standards and OSII reviews every PREA investigation conducted at PA DOC facilities² for quality assurance purposes. OSII's PREA data collection began on June 30, 2014, making 2015 the first complete year of data collection, which was stored in a centralized repository.

The incident-based data collected by OSII has been analyzed and compiled in order to obtain the information required for the United States (US) Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) Survey of Sexual Victimization (SSV-2). Pennsylvania sends this report annually, summarizing the total number of allegations reported in PA DOC facilities and CCCs in the previous calendar year. These numbers are classified by type:

- **Inmate-on-Inmate Nonconsensual Sexual Acts:**
Sexual contact of any person without his or her consent, or of a person who is unable to consent or refuse; AND contact between the penis and the vulva, or the penis and the anus including penetration, however slight; OR contact between the mouth and the penis, vulva, or anus; OR penetration of the anal or genital opening of another person, however slight, by a hand, finger, object, or other instrument.
- **Inmate-on-Inmate Abusive Sexual Contact:**
Sexual contact of any person without his or her consent, or of a person who is unable to consent or refuse; AND intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or buttocks of any person. Excluded are incidents in which the contact was incidental to a physical altercation.
- **Inmate-on-Inmate Sexual Harassment:**
Repeated and unwanted sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or verbal comments, gestures, or actions of a derogatory or offensive sexual nature by one inmate directed toward another.
- **Staff-on-Inmate Sexual Misconduct:**
Any behavior or act of sexual nature directed toward an inmate by an employee, volunteer, contractor, official visitor, or other agency representative (excludes family, friends, or other visitors). Sexual relationships of a romantic nature between staff and inmates are included in this definition. Consensual or nonconsensual sexual acts include: intentional touching, either directly or through the clothing, of the genitalia, anus, groin, breast, inner thigh, or

buttocks that is unrelated to official duties or with the intent to abuse, arouse, or gratify sexual desire; OR completed, attempted, threatened, or requested sexual acts; OR occurrences of indecent exposure, invasion of privacy, or staff voyeurism for reasons unrelated to official duties or for sexual gratification.

- **Staff-on-Inmate Sexual Harassment:**

Repeated verbal statements, comments or gestures of a sexual nature to an inmate by an employee, volunteer, contractor, official visitor, or other agency representative (excluding family, friends, or other visitors). Includes demeaning references to gender; or sexually suggestive or derogatory comments about body or clothing; OR repeated profane or obscene language or gestures.

For each substantiated³ allegation, a five-page Survey of Sexual Victimization Incident Form (SSV-IA) is completed, specifying details of the incident and the individuals involved.

This report summarizes the allegations reported at PA DOC facilities in 2015, as well as allegations reported at Community Contract Facilities (CCFs) and Contracted County Jails (CCJs) with incident data comparative to those reported in 2012, 2013, and 2014. As the numbers reflect, there was a marked increase in the overall number of allegations reported with only a fractional increase in the number of substantiated allegations.

In 2015, the PA DOC established stringent screening for risk of sexual victimization and abusiveness guidelines to include full implementation of an automated PREA Risk Assessment Tool (PRAT) utilized department wide. Specifically, the assessment contains questions that solicit information of prior incidents of sexual abuse while incarcerated, which is reflected in the total number of allegations noted within this report. Enhancements to existing policies and practices, as well as concentrated training efforts, have contributed to a more consistent reporting environment as well.

During 2015, the PA DOC collaborated with the state juvenile justice system, county jails, and The Moss Group through a demonstration grant awarded by the US Department of Justice. The purpose of this collaboration was to intensify the safe and secure implementation of proactive and responsive cross gender supervision practices and promote a culture of sexual safety in Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. Additional achievements include the hiring of a full time statewide PREA coordinator, the formation of the PREA Compliance Division, the creation of a centralized repository for local PREA Compliance Managers to use as a resource center, and the dissemination to line staff of multiple trauma informed resources, including QuickSeries pocket guides.

In 2015, the PA DOC continued to deliver regular specialized investigations trainings to security staff and other SCI representatives. Lessons learned during the first audit cycle further enhanced the PA DOC's efforts to fulfill its obligations under PREA. This dedicated focus to eliminating systemic and operational shortcomings ensures the Department's ability to produce the most accurate picture (and subsequent reduction of sexual abuse allegations).

[Part 1: Inmate Perpetrators](#)

In 2015, a total of 486 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual abuse and sexual harassment allegations were reported within PA DOC facilities. Of these inmate-on-inmate complaints, 38 incidents (7.8 percent⁴) were substantiated. One hundred and fifty-three (31.5 percent) inmate perpetrator allegations involved nonconsensual sexual acts, 129 (26.5 percent) involved allegations of abusive sexual contact and 204 (42 percent) involved inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment.

In 2015, a total of 29 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual abuse and sexual harassment were reported within CCFs. Of these inmate-on-inmate allegations, ten (34.5 percent) were substantiated. Two (7 percent) inmate perpetrator allegations involved nonconsensual sexual acts, fifteen (51.7 percent) involved allegations of abusive sexual contact, and 12 (41.4 percent) involved inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment.

Nonconsensual Sexual Acts

One allegation of an inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual sexual act was substantiated in a PA DOC facility, while 107 (70 percent) allegations were unsubstantiated⁵ and 35 (23 percent) were unfounded⁶. At the time of this report ten investigations remained open and the outcomes were not yet determined (Table 1).

Two allegations of inmate-on-inmate nonconsensual acts were made within CCFs in 2015, one was determined to be unsubstantiated and one investigation remained open with an unknown outcome at the time of this report (Table 2).

Abusive Sexual Contact

Of the 129 allegations of inmate-on-inmate abusive sexual contact in PA DOC facilities, 12 (9.3 percent) allegations were substantiated, 96 (74.4 percent) of allegations were unsubstantiated and 19 (14.7 percent) were unfounded. At the time of this report, two investigations remained open and the outcomes were not yet determined. (Table 3).

Fifteen allegations of inmate-on-inmate abusive sexual contact were made within CCFs in 2015, six (40 percent) were substantiated, seven (46.7 percent) were determined to be unsubstantiated and two (13.3 percent) were unfounded (Table 4).

Sexual Harassment

Table 5 illustrates that inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment allegations within PA DOC facilities doubled from 2014 to 2015. However, the substantiated incidents only increased by 25 percent during this period. The increase in sexual harassment allegations are indicative of the PA DOC's efforts in improved reporting and staff training facility wide. Of the 204 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment reported in PA DOC facilities, 25 (12.2 percent) of allegations were substantiated, 159 (77.9 percent) allegations were unsubstantiated and 19 (9.3 percent) were unfounded. At the time of this report one investigation remained open and the outcome is unknown.

Of the 12 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment reported in CCFs, four (33.3 percent) allegations were substantiated, eight (66.6 percent) allegations were unsubstantiated and no allegations were unfounded (Table 6).

Part 2: Staff Perpetrators

The majority of sexual abuse or sexual harassment allegations made at PA DOC facilities involved staff. A total of 790 allegations against staff were reported in 2015, up from 500 the year before. This increase can be attributed to improved investigative procedures and tracking systems in place. The number of substantiated allegations against staff increased by six in 2015.

In CCFs, a total of 39 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual abuse or sexual harassment were reported in 2015. Twenty-seven of the 39 allegations were of staff sexual misconduct, and the remaining 12 allegations involved sexual harassment.

Staff Sexual Misconduct

Of the 504 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct in PA DOC facilities, thirteen (2.6 percent) of allegations were substantiated, 254 (50.4 percent) of allegations were unsubstantiated, and 226 (44.8 percent) were unfounded (Table 7). At the time of this report 11 investigations remained open and the outcomes were not yet determined.

Twenty-seven allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual misconduct were made within CCFs in 2015, three (11.1 percent) were substantiated, 15 (55.5 percent) were determined to be unsubstantiated and seven (25.9 percent) were unfounded. At the time of this report two investigations remained open and the outcomes were unknown (Table 8).

Staff Sexual Harassment

As Table 9 illustrates, staff-on-inmate sexual harassment allegations within PA DOC facilities increased marginally between 2014 and 2015; however, only one percent of total allegations were substantiated. Of the 286 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual harassment reported in PA DOC facilities, three (one percent) of allegations were substantiated, 239 (83.6 percent) allegations were unsubstantiated and 44 (15.4 percent) were unfounded.

Of the 12 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual harassment reported in CCFs, three (25 percent) of the allegations were substantiated, six (50 percent) of the allegations were unsubstantiated, and three (25 percent) of the allegations were unfounded (Table 10).

Part 3: Contracted County Jails (CCJs)

The PA DOC contracts with a numerous county jails to house inmates who would have otherwise returned to an SCI under the Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI). Table 11 (below) provides a breakdown of the county jails with whom PA DOC contracts and whether or not sexual abuse and sexual harassment information was provided to the PA DOC for this report. Information not reported by the CCJs are excluded from Tables 12 and 13.

A total of 88 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual abuse were made at CCJs in 2015, six (6.8 percent) of which were substantiated, 47 (53.4 percent) were unsubstantiated and 34 (38.6 percent) were unfounded. At the time of this report, one investigation remained open with an undetermined outcome.

A total of 42 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual abuse were made within CCJs in 2015, none of which were substantiated, 15 (38 percent) were unsubstantiated, and 26 (62 percent) were unfounded.

As Table 12 illustrates, there was a two-fold increase in the number of sexual abuse allegations within CCJs. This increase can be attributed to increased reporting compliance. In 2014, only 12 (54.5 percent) CCJs reported PREA statistical information for the annual report. In 2015, that compliance rate increased to 82 percent.

⁹ In 2014, CCJs reported the total number of sexual abuse and sexual harassment allegations and did not specify whether the allegations were made against staff or inmates.

A total of 134 allegations of inmate-on-inmate sexual harassment allegations were made at CCJs in 2015, 28 (20.9 percent) were determined to be substantiated, 63 (47 percent) were unsubstantiated, and 43 (32.1 percent) were unfounded.

A total of 82 allegations of staff-on-inmate sexual harassment were made within CCJs in 2015, eight (9.8 percent) of which were substantiated, 46 (56.1 percent) were unsubstantiated, 28 (34.1 percent) were unfounded.

As Table 13 illustrates, there was a near four-fold increase in the number of sexual harassment allegations within CCJs. Again, the increase can be attributed to increased reporting compliance.



Conclusion

This third annual PREA report reflects the PA DOC's efforts to create sexual safety awareness and multiple safe reporting options. This awareness has now taken root throughout PA's justice system and has been reducing the fear of reporting risk throughout the incarcerated population. As a result of this increased comfort level in reporting, the number of sexual abuse and sexual harassment allegations has likewise increased. However, while the total number of allegations increased by 39.6 percent, the rate of substantiated incidents decreased from 6 percent to 4.3 percent in 2015. Over time, these numbers are predicted to balance out as all correctional facilities throughout the Commonwealth continue to meet PREA compliance and consistently exhibit a standard of zero tolerance.
